Т	o provide for United States actions to advance the United States-India strategic relationship.
1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "United States-India
5	Enhanced Cooperation Act of 2018".
6	SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
7	Congress finds the following:

1	(1) The turmoil in the world poses a serious
2	threat to United States national security interests
3	and requires cooperation with allies and friendly na-
4	tions that are willing to work with the United States
5	in pursuit of shared objectives.
6	(2) The June 7, 2016, paragraph 17 of the
7	India-United States Joint Statement entitled "The
8	United States and India: Enduring Global Partners
9	in the 21st Century", notes that the United States-
10	India defense relationship can be an anchor of sta-
11	bility, and given the increasingly strengthened co-
12	operation in defense, the United States recognized
13	India as a Major Defense Partner.
14	(3) As such, the United States committed to
15	continue to work toward facilitating technology shar-
16	ing with and transfer of advanced strategic military
17	capability to India on a level commensurate with
18	that of its closest allies and partners. The leaders of
19	the two countries reached an understanding under
20	which India would receive license-free access to a
21	wide range of dual-use technologies in conjunction
22	with steps that India has committed to take to ad-
23	vance its export control objectives.
24	(4) As such, in support of India's initiative to
25	develop a domestic defense industrial capability and

1	to support integration into the global supply chain,
2	the United States committed to continuing to facili-
3	tate the export of goods and technologies, consistent
4	with United States law, for projects, programs and
5	joint ventures in support of official United States-
6	India defense and security cooperation.
7	(5) Section 1292 of the National Defense Au-
8	thorization Act for Fiscal Year 2017 (22 U.S.C.
9	2751 note), relating to enhancing defense and secu-
10	rity cooperation with India, requests that the Sec-
11	retary of Defense and Secretary of State jointly take
12	such actions as may be necessary to recognize In-
13	dia's status as a major defense partner of the
14	United States, consistent with the June 7, 2016,
15	India-United States Joint Statement.
16	SEC. 3. STATEMENT OF POLICY.
17	It is the policy of the United States—
18	(1) to approve and facilitate the transfer of ad-
19	vanced technology and strategic capability, con-
20	sistent with United States conventional arms trans-
21	fer policy, to support combined military planning
22	with India for missions such as humanitarian assist-
23	ance and disaster relief, counter piracy, freedom of
24	navigation, and maritime domain awareness mis-

1	sions, and to promote weapons systems interoper-
2	ability;
3	(2) to reassure India that the United States
4	recognizes the importance of security of supply for
5	major defense capabilities acquired from the United
6	States and it's industries, and as such will endeavor,
7	consistent with United States law, to not disrupt
8	such supply;
9	(3) to collaborate with the Government of India
10	in developing mutually agreeable mechanisms to
11	verify the security of defense articles, defense serv-
12	ices, and related technology, such as appropriate
13	cyber security and end use monitoring arrange-
14	ments, consistent with United States export control
15	laws and policy;
16	(4) to promote policies that will encourage the
17	efficient review and authorization of defense sales
18	and export to India; and
19	(5) to continue to enhance defense and security
20	cooperation with India in order to advance United
21	States interests in the South Asia and greater Indo-
22	Asia-Pacific regions.

1	SEC. 4. UNITED STATES ACTIONS TO ADVANCE THE UNITED
2	STATES-INDIA STRATEGIC RELATIONSHIP.
3	(a) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
4	gress that the United States should take the following ac-
5	tions to advance the United States-India strategic rela-
6	tionship:
7	(1) Seek to enhance the capabilities of the
8	United States and India to address emerging com-
9	mon threats, increase security cooperation, and ex-
10	pand joint military exercises.
11	(2) Encourage and facilitate the role as priority
12	partners in the South Asia and greater Indo-Asia-
13	Pacific regions.
14	(3) Support the mutual interest in maritime se-
15	curity and maritime domain awareness, as well as
16	enhanced military cooperation in joint exercises,
17	training, and humanitarian assistance and disaster
18	relief.
19	(4) Conduct a joint assessment, led by the Sec-
20	retary of State in partnership with the Secretary of
21	Defense, of the extent to which India possesses ca-
22	pabilities to support and carry out military oper-
23	ations of mutual interest to the United States and
24	India, including an assessment of the defense export
25	control regulations and policies that need appro-

1	priate modification, in recognition of India's capa-
2	bilities and its status as a major defense partner.
3	(b) Use of Assessment.—The Secretary of State
4	shall ensure that the assessment described in subsection
5	(a)(4) is used, consistent with United States conventional
6	arms transfer policy, to inform the review by the United
7	States of requests to export defense articles, defense serv-
8	ices, or related technology to India under the Arms Export
9	Control Act (22 U.S.C. 2751 et seq.), and to inform any
10	regulatory and policy adjustments that may be appro-
11	priate.
12	(c) Foreign Military Sales and Export Status
13	UNDER ARMS EXPORT CONTROL ACT.—The Arms Ex-
14	port Control Act (22 U.S.C. 2751 et seq.) is amended—
15	(1) in sections $3(d)(2)(B)$ , $3(d)(3)(A)(i)$ ,
16	3(d)(5), 21(e)(2)(A), 36(b)(1), 36(b)(2), 36(b)(6),
17	36(e)(2)(A), 36(e)(5), 36(d)(2)(A), 62(e)(1), and
18	63(a)(2), by inserting "India," before "or New Zea-
19	land" each place it appears;
20	(2) in section 3(b)(2), by inserting "the Govern-
21	ment of India," before "or the Government of New
22	Zealand"; and
23	(3) in sections $21(h)(1)(A)$ and $21(h)(2)$ , by in-
24	serting "India," before "or Israel" each place it ap-
25	pears.
